

THOUGHTS FROM FATHER LAZARUS

Catholic social teaching is a body of doctrine that applies the wisdom of the Catholic Church to the challenges of society, politics, economics, and culture. Rooted in Scripture and tradition, it promotes human dignity and the common good through core principles. The core principles of Catholic Social Teaching are:

- ~Life and Dignity of the Human Person: Every individual is made in the image of God and possesses inherent dignity and rights.
- ~Call to Family, Community, and Participation: The family is the foundation of society, and all people have a right and responsibility to participate in their communities.
- ~Rights and Responsibilities: All people have fundamental rights, such as the right to life and subsistence, but these must be balanced with responsibilities toward others.
- ~Option for the Poor and Vulnerable: The Church has a special commitment to the poor and marginalized, and their needs must be a priority.
- ~Dignity of Work and Rights of Workers: Work is a way to participate in God's creation, and workers have a right to just wages, safe conditions, and dignity.
- ~Solidarity: We are one human family, called to empathy, care, and mutual support for one another across the world.
- ~Care for God's Creation: As stewards of the Earth, we must care for the environment, recognizing it as a gift from God and for future generations.

This Sunday's readings from Prophet Amos and St. Luke require more than a quick read to get to the deeper meaning. A casual glimpse may lead one to interpret these readings as a strong condemnation of material wealth and comfort. That is not to say that these readings do not have anything to say about this. What Amos speaks strongly against is the complacency of those he is addressing. When we are comfortable, it can be easy to forget the plight of others. Prophet Amos is expressing distress over those people who have become "complacent."

The Gospel; the unnamed rich man is wealthy, well-fed, draped in purple garments, and comfortable. Lazarus is poor, starving, clothed in sores, and lying outside the door of the rich man. When the two men die, their plights continue to be the opposite of each other.

The message is crystal clear: both Prophet Amos and Jesus tell us that we must not ignore or become desensitized to the suffering around us, that we must work to relieve it so that others might also have healthy lives. If we pay attention to our actions during our earthly lives and resolve to stay close to God, we will remain close to him after our time on earth is ended.

The readings present us with more than contrasting pictures of wealth versus poverty, but rather, we are shown how wealth might blind one to seeing the poor, and how one state of comfort prevents the growth of a compassionate heart. We can become so complacent that laziness creeps in, preventing the development of an active Gospel life modelled on the life of Christ with an openness to all in need--that preferential option for the poor that appears in the scriptures throughout this liturgical year. How does our parish as a community serve those in need? I encourage everyone to read the Catechism of the Catholic Church section on social justice (CCC 1928-1948)



Umeri to Present "Into One Song" Concert on October 5

Des Moines, Iowa – Umeri, the Drake University Alumni Choir, announced its first concert of the 2025-2026 season. "Into One Song" will take place Sunday, Oct. 5, at 2 p.m. at Sheslow Auditorium on the Drake campus. 24 Drake Choir alumni will perform. The concert will feature Alex Berko's *Sacred Place* and Mozart's *Missa brevis in F Major*, KV 192.

Featured performers, in addition to Umeri, include members of the Des Moines Symphony and soloists Elizabeth Fisher, Mollie Lawler, Eric Ferring, and Thomas McCargar.

The concert will explore the ways in which ritual and community-gathering contribute to the experience of human connection and transcendence. A primary goal for Umeri is to provide opportunities for both performers and listeners to "go deeper" in exploring the context of the music and words.

"Umeri is exploring the concepts of community, ritual, tradition, and the idea of sacred places — within us, in nature, and in human-created spaces," said Umeri founder and conductor, Aimee Beckmann-Collier. "We have done so in conversations with a Drake English professor and Director of Drake's Harkin Institute, Dr. Craig Owens, and Alex Berko, composer of *Sacred Place*, as well as three experts on ritual and community-gathering: Rabbi Neal Schuster, Temple B'nai Jeshurun, Rev. Tim Fitzgerald, Diocese of Des Moines, and Kyle Lechtenberg, West Des Moines United Methodist Church.

The audience will also have an opportunity to consider these concepts by attending the pre-concert talk, "Being and Belonging: The Role of Ritual in Creating Relationships and Meaning" on October 5 at 1 p.m. in Levitt Hall, Old Main, Drake University. This session will feature some of the presenters listed above in a stimulating conversation that will include time for audience questions and comments.
