THOUGHTS FROM FATHER LAZARUS

This is the first Sunday of the new liturgical year, the First Sunday of Advent. This year, we return to the A cycle of readings, with the gospel focus mostly on the Gospel of Matthew. Advent begins with a question: What are we waiting for? This question is both ancient and immediate. It echoes through the prophets in the Bible and stirs the wilderness cry of John the Baptist, and rests quietly in the heart of a young woman who says yes. It lingers in our souls, in our longing for peace, our hunger for meaning, and our ache for healing.

But Advent doesn't exist in a vacuum. The waiting gives way to wonder. The promise becomes presence, and that question is transformed. Once Christ has come, the question becomes: Now that he is here, how shall we live? We're not waiting for time to pass. We are waiting for a world to change and for ourselves to be ready to help change it.

In today's first reading, we hear the prophet Isaiah calling us to climb to the top of the mountain and look for the Lord's advent, the Lord's coming into our lives. At the end of today's first reading, when we hear Isaiah cry out, "O house of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the Lord!" We need to understand that Isaiah isn't simply talking about nature's daylight and nighttime darkness; he is talking about what we see with our minds and hearts. He's calling us to rise above our daily worries, concerns, and anxieties in order to take a look over the whole of our lives with all of their peaks and valleys. As Christians, we do that in the vision of Christ, the Light of the World, and God's gift to us.

The problem you and I face comes not from the fact that we are unconcerned or apathetic, or lazy. The problem you and I have is that we're far too concerned about so many other things. Often these are legitimate concerns, worries that are thrust upon us by the world in which we live. We are so caught up in all of the events of our days that we do not pay attention to our souls, our inner spirits, and our inner selves. This spiritual blindness is spoken of in biblical language as darkness. And what do we do in darkness? Usually, we sleep. We sleep because we shut down, tune out, and turn off.

When we, through accident, through chance, or in some other unexpected event, become aware of God's activity in our lives, we suddenly pay attention — we wake up. And in that moment of waking up, we likely think that God's coming to us is sudden, unexpected, startling. God has, however, always been there. He is actively present to us all of the time, each and every day. It's our awareness of Him that has changed. God hasn't changed in the slightest way. He is constant; He is always present. It is we who are inconstant, changeable, and inattentive.

We often speak of Advent as being a season of time in which we prepare for the Lord's coming into our lives. Perhaps we should see it as a season of heightened awareness, for the truth is that we should be looking for God already at work in our lives every day. God is always offering Himself to us. We, however, are not always responding because we're not paying attention. Advent is a time to conscientiously, deliberately, and with awareness respond to His offer of Himself to us. We have to "see the Light," so to speak.

The question I would suggest we ask ourselves as we begin this Advent is: Where do I see moments of "sleepiness" in my life and family life? Times when we overlook each other and take each other for granted? How can we help one another "stay awake" to kindness, gratitude, and peace this week? Choose one daily individual or family practice to help you stay awake, lighting a candle at dinner and sharing one moment of gratitude, checking each other before bed, or taking a moment of silence each morning. Make this Advent and Christmas different, stay awake!


We reached our 2025 goal. We are so thankful to everyone who contributed and helped us exceed our goal by \$205.


Christmas Poinsettias - \$20 Deadline is Dec. 14
